Course objective/description:

The purpose of this course is to present an overview of modern macroeconomics and microeconomic theory. After covering general economics concepts, we will focus on microeconomics. In this portion of the course, we will cover what affects demand. (This is the field of consumer behaviour). We will then cover consumer expenditure which looks at the effects of incomes, spending, and consumption patterns.

Once we have completed the microeconomics portion of the course, we will turn our focus to macroeconomic. This section of the course will provide some insights on how economic events, government (fiscal) policy, affect business and economic output.

The course is primarily for undergraduate Journalism majors.

Attendance:

Regular class attendance is required. I could make changes to exam dates, and course material could be handed out. If for some reason you miss a class, it is the student's responsibility, *not the professor's*, to know what transpired in class.

I will take attendance. We have a very small number of classes, of which four of them are exams. If you miss more than three classes without an acceptable excuse, you will get an "F0" in the class.¹

If someone is caught signing in for a different student, both students will receive an "F" in the class (I consider this to be cheating).

¹ I define acceptable excuses as medical treatment or prison during class hours.

Courtesy:

Students need to come to class on time, and he/she should plan to attend for the entire lecture. Please turn your cell phones and other electronic devices off prior to entering the classroom. Do not bring your laptop; you will not need it. In test time, I will deduct 5 points from your exam if any devices ring or make a noise! Students should read and view videos on assigned chapters before attending the class. Reading the chapter before class can make a huge difference.

Important:

Many students are under the impression that if they miss every class and/or exams, I can help them pass or give them an incomplete. I cannot. The student must go to class, do exercises, ask intelligent questions, and ask for help well before final exam date.
