




Scientific Advances during WW II

- NWS reports that aircraft reconnaissance reduced loss of life in the Great Hurricane of 1944
 Radar first used in Hawana/Tampa
 Hurricane of 1944 (12-23 OCT)

 First eye radiosonde from Tampa
 Remembered as "The Big One" in

- Chicago

 Former military & naval meteorologists enter the field




TF 38 and Typhoon "COBRA" of December 1944


- TF 38, Fast Carrier Force covering invasion of the Philippines
- Retired eastward ro refuel an rearm
 Many ships low on fuel

 Pumped water ballast

 Free-surface effect

- Free-surface effect
 Addition of antiaircraft guns and radar increased topside weight and reduced stability.
 Kosco (CTF Met) thought N winds were from a cold front
 Thought Typhoon "COBRA" was far to the ESE based upon faulty aircraft reports and assessments from Fleet Weather
 COBPA extendity proceed elsevit 20
- COBRA actually passed about 30 nmi south of the fueling rendezvous point













Summary

- Surprise" Hurricane of 1943 (25-29JUL)Hit Galveston, TX as a CAT 1 with little warning, first flight into a TC
 Great Hurricane of '44 (9-16SEP)

 Cape Verde storm, replay of '38 storm

 Affected Cape Hattersa and struck southern New England as CAT3

 Sank S Navy & Coast Guard ships, drowning 356 salors, but killed only 46 ashore...

 attributed his tues are incent recommaissance

 Typhoon 'COBRA (17-18DEC44)

 Hit US 3" Fleet (TF38), under ADM Halsey
 Refueling and rearming after Lete Gulf (Philippines) invasion

 CFT Meteorologist Interpreted N wind as cold front
 Fleet steamed west then south into Typhoon's path

 Three destroyers sunk, 790 salors lost
 Extensive damage to other ships, especially aircraft carriers

 Havana-Tampa (Pinar del Rio) Hurricane (12-23 OCT44)
 Formed in Caribbean, passed over western Cuba to landfall hear Sarasota

 Devastating in Pinar del Rio and Havan provinces
 First radar observation and first rawinsonde ascent in the eye

 Richmond Field: Destroyed by CAT3 hurricane 15SEP45. Site of present METRO ZOO
