## Plurals & Possessives

### Plural Nouns

Just because a plural noun ends in s doesn't mean it needs an apostrophe. Use the apostrophe only for a possessive noun.

Here are some sentences with plural nouns ending in s, but no possessive connection is shown. Apostrophes would be incorrect:

The **brothers** are **partners** in computer consulting **businesses**.

The **Browns** each play a few instruments in several **orchestras**.

The **Joneses** wear straw **hats** on **holidays**.

Your **records** indicate the **Lees** made several **errors**.

The **Nguyens** own **factories** in both small **towns**.

## PLURAL NOUNS ENDING IN S

Add only an apostrophe to make a PLURAL noun that ends in s possessive.

#### One - Word Possessives

The **dentists**' desk are on wheels. (more than one dentist)
The **witnesses**' statements are false. (more than one witness)
Send the **technicians**' report to the lab. (more than one technician)
Three **days**' work is needed to complete the job. (more than one day)
The **Hawkeses**' offices are in Visalia. (more than one person named Hawkes)

# **EXCEPTION**

**There are none!** The exception rule shown under the Singular Nouns heading is for singular possessive only – *not* for plurals.

## PLURAL NOUNS NOT ENDING IN S

If a plural noun does not end in s, add 's to make it possessive.

Notice that the underlined irregular nouns are plural but don't end in s.

Men's suits are very colorful this year.
The trustee controls the <u>children</u>'s assets.
The <u>alumni</u>'s contributions were small.

## **COMPOUND PLURAL POSSESSIVES**

Some compound words become plural by adding s to the first word – as in sons-in-law. This plural does not end in s but in w.

If a plural compound noun is possessive, first spell the plural. Then add the 's to the end of the compound noun.

Newspaper reporters listened attentively to five **editors in chief's** speeches. [The *s* after *editor* makes the compound expression plural. The 's after *chief* makes it possessive.]

My **brothers-in-law's** appetites amaze me. [plural possessive]
